Wishes about the present

Past form of the verb to talk about the present.

I wish I knew his phone number.

I wish I was rich.



Wishes about the present

Difference between...

I wish I could fly. I wish I could tell you. and

I wish I was rich. I wish I knew the answer.



Wishes about the present

Difference between...

I wish I could fly. I wish I could tell you. and

I wish I was rich. I wish I knew the answer.

Not in terms of meaning (both about something that is not the case). Both are past forms of source verbs I can fly (>could), I am rich (>was), etc.

Wishes about the past

What's the form?
Imagine 'We took off too late.'

I wish...

Wishes about the past

What's the form?

I wish we'd taken off earlier.



Wishes about the past

What's the form?

I wish I had known the answer yesterday.

I wish she had told me that earlier.



Hope

?

I hope you enjoy / will enjoy the movie.

Hope

?

I hope you enjoy / will enjoy the movie.

Both are attested. Little difference.

Both refer to the future possibility.

Not the case that one is more distant future.



Hope

?

I hope you will enjoy / can enjoy the movie.

Hope

?

I hope you will enjoy / can enjoy the movie.

Again, little difference, but...

The variant with 'can' also focuses on ability.

Can be ironic: sounds like the speaker almost questions the listener's ability to enjoy.



Annoyance, disappointment: Wish + would

"Wishes with *would* are about general behaviour or habits, often bad ones which we wish would change."

I wish they would all just shut up.

I wish you'd quit interrupting me.

I wish you'd learn to knock on the door. Knock,

knock, okay?



Annoyance, disappointment: Wish + would

What's annoying in the following title of Phil Collins' song:

I wish it would rain down.



Annoyance, disappointment: Wish + would

What's annoying in the following title of Phil Collins' song:

I wish it would rain down.

Is the textbook rule wrong?



Annoyance, disappointment: Wish + would

Fortunately not.

Phil Collins' title is a poetic play on:

I wish it wouldn't rain (so much).



Annoyance, disappointment: Wish + would

Important point:

Wish + would is not merely a version of the wish construction with the past form of the verb will.

There really is an 'annoyance' factor in its use.



Annoyance, disappointment: Wish + would

I wish they wouldn't air this show again.

I wish he wouldn't treat her that way.

I wish the guy in the band would ask me out!

I wish you wouldn't talk about her when you're around me.

I wish they would ask for my advice more often.



WOULD RATHER, WOULD SOONER

Expressing choice

...rather + bare infinitive

I'd rather **spend** eternity in hell than...
I'd sooner **have** hot tea than hot beer.



WOULD RATHER, WOULD SOONER

Expressing choice

...rather + NP + past form

I'd rather you .didn't... go around talking behind my back.

I'd sooner she ...kept ... her mouth shut.



WOULD PREFER

Expressing choice

...would prefer + to- infinitive

I'd prefer to stay at home (without mentioning alternate actions)

I'd prefer to stay at home waste time at the mall.

WOULD PREFER

Expressing choice

...would prefer + to- infinitive

I'd prefer to stay at home (without mentioning alternate actions)

I'd prefer to stay at home <u>rather than</u> waste time at the mall.

[WOULD PREFER]

Expressing choice

...would prefer + NP + ...

I'd prefer that you didn't mention this to anyone. I'd prefer it if you didn't mention this to anyone. I'd prefer you not to mention this to anyone.



[IT'S TIME]

Expressing emergency, pressing need.



[IT'S TIME]

Expressing emergency, pressing need.

It's time NP + past tense

It's time Bill grew up.

It's time they got a taste of their own medicine.



Real vs. unreal

She looks as if she knows the answer. She looks as if she knew the answer.

It seems as though we reallyget a raise.



Real vs. unreal

She looks as if she knows the answer. She looks as if she knew the answer.

It seems as though we really are.gaing.to..get a raise.



Similar contrast:

He talks like an expert. He talks as an expert.



Similar contrast:

He talks like an expert. (=but he's not one.) He talks as an expert. (=he really is an expert.)
